

A Comprehensive Look at Illegal Gambling and Alleged Skill Games in Pennsylvania



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This packet compiles publicly available information from news articles, business registrations, and court records concerning illegal gambling devices in Pennsylvania. These machines are frequently marketed or disguised as "skill games," yet they have been the focus of numerous investigations, seizures, and criminal prosecutions.

It is important to note that not all skill games are illegal. For instance, Pennsylvania skill games designed by Pace-O-Matic² have been proven in court to qualify as legal skill games.


The aim of this packet is to identify the risks associated with illegal gambling devices and to analyze how certain businesses and individuals have been repeatedly connected to their distribution. By synthesizing this information, we hope to provide a clearer understanding of the challenges and legal implications surrounding illegal gambling practices in the state. This insight will be valuable for stakeholders seeking to navigate this complex landscape legally.

News Overview

1. “Onetime Allegheny County video poker kingpin faces new charges” ‘The little bit I have left is all legal’⁶

a. A May 2025 article from the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette discusses the prevalence of illegal video poker machines in Pennsylvania. The article details how these machines are often marketed as skill games but operate similarly to traditional slot machines, raising concerns about their legality and the need for regulatory oversight. The piece also touches on the challenges faced by law enforcement in addressing this issue.

John F. “Duffy” Conley, now 61, spent years battling local and federal authorities on a slew of charges related to the video poker empire he built in the late 1980s and early 1990s. The feds alleged in his first trial in early 1995 that his 4,000 video poker machines were pulling in some \$600,000 a week.

Now, some 30 years later, the state Attorney General’s office alleges that Conley was the man behind 400 illegal gambling machines seized from hundreds of locations across the region last year.

The criminal complaints against Buffalo Skill Games and J.J. Amusement lays out the gray area that is the difference between legal and illegal video gambling devices in Pennsylvania law.

It comes down to skill versus chance, according to the complaint. Games of skill are legal. Games of chance are not. That difference, in legal parlance, is known as the “predominant factor test.”

Often, the games operate like a traditional slot machine — spinning wheels feature various symbols, and landing three of the same symbol means a win.

Pennsylvania State police Trooper Eric Guido wrote in the affidavit that video gambling device manufacturers try to skirt that skill vs. chance test by adding what’s called a “nudge” feature. When a player matches two of three symbols, they’re offered a chance to “nudge” the third wheel up or down to create three of a kind.

“When two symbols match,” Trooper Guido wrote, “even a child would be able to identify the correct symbol to ‘nudge’ in order to create three in a row.”

While pushing either the “up” or “down” button creates a degree of interaction, the trooper wrote, “it does not transform a slot machine into a game of ‘skill.’”

According to the complaint, all of the gambling machines in question were either illegal slot machine games or similar games modified with the “nudge” feature. Both, investigators said, are illegal.

2. “AG’s Office Says It Seized Hundreds of Illegal Gambling Machines Disguised as Skill Games”⁷

- a. In May 2025, the Pennsylvania Attorney General’s Office announced the **seizure of over 400 illegal gambling machines** from various establishments across western Pennsylvania. These machines were allegedly supplied by two companies owned by a Pittsburgh man, **John F. “Duffy” Conley**, with prior convictions for illegal gambling.
- b. The companies, **J.J. Amusements** and **Buffalo Skill Games**, are each charged with a felony count of being a corrupt organization. A search of their warehouse in Homestead uncovered \$175,000 in cash and an elaborate surveillance system monitoring gambling locations.
- c. The devices in question were described as **slot machines disguised as skill games**, requiring players to use judgment to win.
- d. Federal court records indicate that the owner, **John F. Conley**, was convicted of gambling and money laundering in 1995. Conley and his son, **John D. Conley**, are also named in court documents as leaders of an illegal gambling enterprise that paid nearly \$100,000 in kickbacks to a former state police corporal.

The owner, John F. Conley, is also named in a 2024 grand jury presentment [charging a former executive of skill game maker Pace-O-Matic](#) with taking kickbacks for ignoring complaints to the company about illegal gambling machines.

The attorney general’s office said its agents and state troopers seized more than 400 illegal gambling devices from dozens of western Pennsylvania establishments in a series of raids in March.

J.J. Amusements and Buffalo Skill Games are each charged with a felony count of being a corrupt organization, according to court documents. No lawyers for the companies are named in the court filings.

“These devices were essentially slot machines dressed up as skill games,” Attorney General Dave Sunday said in a statement. “I commend our partners at the Pennsylvania State Police for helping disband a large-scale operation that netted a tremendous amount of illegal gambling profits.”

3. Tinicum Motel Raided for Gambling Machines”⁸

- a. In June 2023, authorities raided the Tinicum Motel, uncovering illegal gambling machines operating on the premises. The raid is part of a broader effort by law enforcement to crack down on illegal gambling operations throughout Pennsylvania. While the article does not directly link the raid to Conley’s businesses, it illustrates the ongoing issue of illegal gambling machines in the state.

On Sept. 19, the machines were inspected by Detective Robert Lythgoe, and members of the state police, Bureau of Liquor Control Enforcement, with \$2,168 removed.

On Thursday law enforcement charged John Conley, 60, and Buffalo Skill Game with multiple counts of having gambling devices and allowing gambling on the premises.

4. “Video Poker Kingpin Pleads Guilty in Sports-Betting Ring”⁹

a. In May 2009, a prominent figure in the video poker industry pleaded guilty to charges related to a sports-betting ring. The individual admitted to operating illegal gambling activities, which included the distribution of video poker machines that were used in unregulated gambling operations. This case highlights the ongoing issues with illegal gambling devices in Pennsylvania and the individuals behind their distribution.

A former South Side man who ran a multimillion-dollar sports-betting ring pleaded guilty Tuesday to federal gambling charges, his third conviction for such crimes.

John "Duffy" Conley, 45, took millions of dollars in wagers from Allegheny County to Las Vegas, prosecutors said.

In 1995, a federal judge sentenced Conley to nine years in prison for running a \$15-million-a-year video poker business. Conley had about 4,000 video poker machines in businesses throughout Western Pennsylvania.

A federal grand jury in 1997 indicted Conley and a group of co-defendants with ties to the Pittsburgh Mafia for creating a bogus consortium to prevent gambling regulators from learning their identities and criminal records in order to run the Rincon River Oaks Casino near San Diego.

- **Buffalo Skill Games (2020)**
 - Registered by John F. Conley, alleged supplier of hundreds of illegal video gambling machines seized across Western PA.

I transferred to the Bureau of Criminal Investigations Western Organized Crime Unit in May of 2021. In my current position as an investigator, I am responsible for conducting undercover and covert investigations of corrupt organizations relating to racketeering activities as defined by Section 911 of Title 18, PA Consolidated Statutes within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. I have received outside training from agencies including but not limited to: The Pennsylvania State Police, Drug Enforcement Agency, and the Northeast Counterdrug Training Center, to include Illegal Gambling Device Identification, Financial Investigations, Interview and Interrogation, Leveraging Open-Source Resources, Intelligence Gathering, Narcotics Interdiction, Narcotics Investigations, Top Gun Undercover Narcotics Investigations, Identifying Deceptive Behavior, Drug Identification, Clandestine Laboratory Training, and was previously a Drug Recognition Expert (DRE), and other relevant extensive training over the years as an investigator. I have been admitted as an expert witness in regard to Drug Identification and Drug Distribution in Centre County and Juniata County Court of Common Pleas. FACTS IN SUPPORT OF THE CRIMINAL COMPLAINT

Buffalo Skill Games, Inc. was formed as a domestic business corporation with a date of incorporation of October 20, 2020, with a registered office at 602 Baldwin Street, Bridgeville, PA 15017. For all times relevant to this affidavit of probable cause, John Fitzgerald Conley (hereinafter referred to as "Conley") was the owner and operator of Buffalo Skills.

J.J. Amusement, Inc. was formed as a domestic business corporation with a date of incorporation of March 24, 1992, with the operations registered at 85 South 27th Street, Pittsburgh, PA 15203. For all times relevant to this affidavit of probable cause, Conley was the owner and operator of J.J. Amusement. Hereinafter in this affidavit, Buffalo Skills and J.J. Amusement will be referred to as "the companies".

Both Buffalo Skills and J.J. Amusement dealt with, inter alia, the buying and selling of Video Gaming Devices (VGDs), parts and service of VGDs, and the transport of VGDs to operation locations. Both corporations also dealt in the furnishing of ticket redemption terminals to VGD operation locations, as well as the servicing and technical assistance associated with ticket redemption terminals (ticket redemption terminals are machines whereby one can insert a payment ticket that was generated from a VGD in exchange for the cash value associated with the payment ticket).

EXPLANATION OF LEGALITY OF VIDEO GAMING DEVICES

The determining factor as to whether a VGD is illegal is whether the outcome of the game is determined predominantly by the skill of the player, or, by chance. This has become known in Pennsylvania jurisprudence as the predominate factor test. In recent years, in an effort to overcome Pennsylvania's predominant factor test, VGD manufacturers and software developers have

offered their buyers modified versions of VGDs that require additional player interaction vis-à-vis a traditional slot machine. The purpose of such modifications is to provide a basis for the manufacturers and operators to claim that their machines are based on the player's skill rather than chance.

One such modification is the inclusion of a "nudge" feature. Spinning of the reels on these machines can sometimes result in two matching symbols appearing in a row. When that happens, the player can move, or "nudge," a third symbol up or down so as to create a match of three in a row. Such a match results in a "winning" combination (or at least only a partial loss). When two symbols match, even a child would be able to identify the correct symbol to "nudge" in order to create three in a row. Just in case, however, these machines make it even more obvious: the correct symbol to "nudge" is highlighted in some manner, such as by flashing lights.

While the "nudge" feature does in fact require some degree of player interaction, it does not transform a slot machine into a game of "skill." If there are not at least two symbols already in a row, no successful "nudge" is possible, and therefore no amount of skill can change an otherwise losing spin into a win. Compared to other forms of gambling, such as blackjack or poker, which require a patron to make at least one real decision, no actual skill is required to make a "nudge," and on many spins no "nudge" is even possible. As a result, slot machines with a "nudge" feature are governed by chance, the very essence of gambling. Pennsylvania courts have consistently ruled that VGDs with a "nudge" feature, and nothing more, are gambling devices *per se*. All of the VGDs upon which this affidavit is based were either standard, unmodified slot machines, depicting spinning reels in electronic form, or slot machines modified with the "nudge" feature. Both versions constitute illegal gambling devices under Pennsylvania law.

A different type of modification, involving the addition of a memory test often referred to as a "Follow Me" feature, has been held by an intermediate Pennsylvania court to qualify as a "skill" game that can in effect legalize what would otherwise be illegal slot machines. This feature is essentially akin to playing the flashing light game Simon whereby the player is required to remember a pattern of increasing lengths. If the player successfully completes the feature, he or she is returned the value of their original wager plus a nominal amount.

The Office of Attorney General is challenging the ruling regarding the "Follow me" feature, and the Pennsylvania Supreme Court is currently reviewing it. The charges at issue here are not based on any machines that contain a "Follow Me"-type feature.

March 12, 2024 Seizures

On March 12, 2024, agents from the Office of Attorney General (OAG) and troopers from the Pennsylvania State Police (PSP) executed search warrants at 47 locations that were known by investigators to house VGDs and proceeds from illegal gambling controlled by the companies. These were the companies that provided the VGDs to an array of convenience stores, bars, restaurants, gas stations, and stand-alone storefronts that operated as mini-casinos for the companies' VGDs. While most of the aforementioned locations were owned by persons or entities unaffiliated with the companies, some of the locations were owned by the companies themselves. In most cases, in addition to the VGDs, the establishments had ticket redemption terminals where tickets correlating with winnings from the VGDs could be redeemed for their cash value.

Prior to the execution of these search warrants, PSP Bureau of Liquor Control Enforcement (BLCE) officers and OAG agents went to each one of these locations in an undercover capacity. The law enforcement officers played the VGDs to confirm whether or not they were equipped with any memory-test features that would arguably make them legal "skill" games rather than illegal gambling machines, as defined under current law. The undercover law enforcement officers also verified that the machines took cash or a

- Although not directed at the Conleys, this case reinforces that **Aurora machines** — like those distributed by **Buffalo Skill Games and Pinnacle Vending** — continue to surface in legal proceedings across Pennsylvania.
